RE: NOTICE OF SECURITY BREACH

Please accept this letter on behalf of Fox Entertainment Group (the "Company"), in compliance with Md. Code Ann., Com. Law Section 14-3504(h), as notification of a data security breach that may have compromised the personal information of one Maryland resident.

JPMorgan Chase Bank administers several employee benefit plans for the Companies, including monthly pension benefit payments. JPMorgan recently brought to our attention that an email sent by one of their employees to another client inadvertently included the wrong attachment. The attachment contained personal information about the Maryland resident, including her name, Social Security Number, home address, gross monthly pension benefit amount and deductions withheld. JPMorgan informed us that when the other client received the email, he immediately realized it had been sent in error, deleted the email and all associated information, and informed JPMorgan. We have no information to suggest that personal information of the Maryland resident was disseminated to any other third party or was misused in any way.

JPMorgan has also informed us that this isolated event was the result of failure to follow appropriate control procedures and that additional checks have been implemented to reduce the risk of it happening again.

Enclosed please find a copy of the notification letter that is being mailed to the affected individual.

RE: Fox Pension Plan

Dear Fox Pension Plan Participant:

JPMorgan Chase Bank administers several Company employee benefit plans, including your monthly pension benefit payments. JPMorgan recently brought to the Company's attention that an email sent by one of their employees to another client inadvertently included the wrong attachment. The attachment contained personal information about you and some Company pensioners, including your name, Social Security Number, home address, gross monthly pension benefit amount and deductions withheld. JPMorgan informed us that when the other client received the email, he immediately realized it had been sent in error, deleted the email and all associated information, and informed JPMorgan. JPMorgan has informed us that the recipient was a plan administrator at another client with confidentiality obligations to JPMorgan. We have no information to suggest that your personal information was disseminated to any other third party or was misused in any way. We believe the risk associated with this incident is low. However, we are of course obligated to alert you and we apologize for any inconvenience it may cause.

JPMorgan has also informed us that this isolated event was the result of failure to follow appropriate control procedures and that additional checks have been implemented to reduce the risk of it happening again.

<u>Massachusetts Residents</u>	<p>Massachusetts law allows consumers to place a security freeze on their credit reports. A security freeze prohibits a credit reporting agency from releasing any information from a consumer's credit report without written authorization. However, please be aware that placing a security freeze on your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prevent the timely approval of any requests you make for new loans, credit mortgages, employment, housing or other services. If you have been a victim of identity theft, and you provide the credit reporting agency with a valid police report, it cannot charge you to place, lift or remove a security freeze. In all other cases, a credit reporting agency may charge you up to \$5.00 each to place, temporarily lift, or permanently remove a security freeze.</p> <p>To place a security freeze on your credit report, you must send a written request to <b>each</b> of the three major consumer reporting agencies: Equifax (<a href="http://www.equifax.com">www.equifax.com</a>); Experian (<a href="http://www.experian.com">www.experian.com</a>); and TransUnion (<a href="http://www.transunion.com">www.transunion.com</a>) by regular, certified or overnight mail at the addresses below:</p> <p>Equifax Security Freeze  P.O. In order to request a security freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

- (1) Your full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
- (2) Social Security Number;
- (3) Date of birth;
- (4) If you have moved in the past five (5) years, provide the addresses where you have lived over the prior five years;
- (5) Proof of current address such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
- (6) A legible photocopy of a government issued identification card (state driver's license or ID card, military identification, etc.)
- (7) If you are a victim of identity theft, include a copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft;
- (8) If you are not a victim of identity theft, include payment by check, money order, or credit card (Visa, MasterCard, American Express or Discover only). Do not send cash through the mail.

The credit reporting agencies have three (3) business days after receiving your request to place a security freeze on your credit report. The credit bureaus must also send written confirmation to you within five (5) business days and provide you with a unique personal identification number (PIN) or password, or both that can be used by you to authorize the removal or lifting of the security freeze.

To lift the security freeze in order to allow a specific entity or individual access to your credit report, you must call or send a written request to the credit reporting agencies by mail and include proper identification (name, address, and social security number) **and** the PIN number or password provided to you when you placed the security freeze as well as the identities of those entities or individuals you would like to receive your credit report or the specific period of time you want the credit report available. The credit reporting agencies have three (3) business days after receiving your request to lift the security freeze for those identified entities or for the specified period of time.

To remove the security freeze, you must send a written request to each of the three credit bureaus by mail and include proper identification (name, address, and social security number) **and** the PIN number or password provided to you when you placed the security freeze. The credit bureaus have three (3) business days after receiving your request to remove the security freeze.

Under Massachusetts law, you have the right to obtain any police report filed in regard to this incident. If you are the victim of identity theft, you also have the right to file a police report and obtain a copy of the report that you file.
